

# **Our Strategy**

Through hard work and effective strategy, ETSS has increased its effectiveness and expanded both its services to and awareness of New Americans in Central Ohio and beyond. As the agency strives to accomplish the goals outlined in the strategic plan, ETSS also recognizes the new capabilities and horizons discovered as a result to successfully meeting the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic and the creative, adaptive, and forward-thinking concepts and actions to address those issues.

Many of the tools utilized will continue to be part of the workday models and efforts. Technology, and both the solutions and answers it can provide, will assist in the office (onsite or home), the classroom and communicating with families, schools, and employers. The extraordinary generosity of the private and public sectors has helped build an even stronger network of support for the ETSS mission and clients. These relationships will continue to build throughout Central Ohio, regionally, nationally and through Project Africa, globally.

# Our 2021 Goals

The holistic perspective of the work undertaken by ETSS and the inclusive and diverse philosophy of the agency will allow for the growth and build upon past success to expand into future programs and services for underserved populations. We will continue to expand and share our expertise in training areas (capacity, trauma, and culture) as well as strengthen and share our programming collaboratively throughout Central Ohio and beyond.

To facilitate the access of social services, equity, stability, and advocacy to New Americans through community participation, services coordination, community capacity building, cultural pride, and education.

To support immigrant, refugee, and low-income families, focusing on development of the whole child in a safe environment by providing academic support, Social Emotional Learning, health and wellness, cultural enrichment, and professional development.

To provide adult education, employability training, job search and placement assistance, and career advancement assistance with the goal of creating self-sufficiency and economic stability.

To employ community navigators/advocates who will educate and support families' health and safety with evidenced-base practices grounded in social supports theory and socioecological determinants of health (task shifting model).

To strengthen ETSS both in its infrastructure and resources to be more effective and efficient to carry out its mission.

### **FAMILY ENGAGEMENT**

FEP started late in 2020 partnering with CCS. Within the first 2 months of program, EL student attendance increased by 27% and the program was featured in Columbus Dispatch in January 2021. The FEP service has also expanded to Pickerington Local School District close to the end of 2021 and developed program in alignment with the school district.


### **VACCINE CLINICS**

ETSS Hosted multiple Vaccine Clinics and provided information and opportunity to recieve the vaccine. Staff reached out to the community in linguistically appropriate ways, informing people about the virus and vaccines, combating misinformating, and offering resources to testing and vaccinations, all in the communities we serve and in the languages our clients speak.

### **ADVANCEMENT**

Advancement successfully wrote 48 grants in 2021, expanding the diversity of our funding sources. 775 Donors supported campaigns and events, a 78% contribution rate. Donors over \$100 increased by 48%. We expanded social media outreach and advocacy, including a 107% increase in Facebook activity. 312 people attended the 2021 Virtual Evening Of Promise. ETSS was recognized during United for Impact for most individual donors and our social media campaign.



# Our impact

ETSS Youth programs served over 1147 youth through afterschool, summer and youth summit without service interruption through the COVID-19 pandemic. We held the 2021 Youth Summit at each of our eight sites on August 6th with estimated attendance of 300 youth. The theme for the Youth Summit was Summer Olympics. This was a time where our students could display their talents and work collaboratively with their peers. We were fortunate to welcome partners to visit including our adult department, Transit Art, Seeds of Caring, and We Amplify Voices.
